I hated math and was not good at it, but she helped me through it and was very patient. She used to have colorful daisies in her classroom and to this day I always think of her when I see them at the store.

There were many other teachers I had that made an impact: Mr. Tatum, Mrs. Floyd, Mrs. Cotter, Mrs. Anderson, Mrs. Rodden, Mr. Young, Mr. Reinking, and I keep in touch with most. My SRO, Officer Debbie Rogers, is probably the one I speak to the most. I kept in touch with her all these years and actually got Maxine Rose (my dog) from her. She has been a friend, teacher and an unofficial therapist at times, helping me get through the awkward early twenties stage. ACY OF LEARNIN

As far back as the 1880s, the Meek family can trace their own roots in Spring Hill to the same farm. Over the following decades, it seemed like it was difficult to pinpoint a school vear when a Meek didn't either work at or attend one of the district's schools.

Mark and Tim Meek are just two of those family members ensuring the school's buildings and the students in them are in well prepared for the next generation.

Mark has served as the principal of Spring Hill Middle School for the past three years and his uncle, Tim, has served in various positions with the district, the most recent as the Director of Construction and Safety.

Both Mark and Tim say many of their family members live in town, and even those who do move out of town stay close to Spring Hill. Inevitably, they miss the town so much that they move back.

"It's kind of a family tradition. We're a family of educators," savs Mark, whose father, Bill, served on the school board for

28 years, whose mother Diana was a staunch and enthusiastic supporter of the district, and whose brother and sister are both educators.

Tim's father Bud was the buildings and grounds supervisor and Tim filled that position when his dad retired in 1994, while his mother, Marlys, worked as foodservice director, regularly providing hungry students with her famous homemade cinnamon rolls, which were always in demand.

Both Tim and Mark met and married their high school sweethearts, Mark met his wife, Stephanie, and Tim met his wife, Sharon, while going to school in Spring Hill.

GENERATIONS OF MEEK FAMILY HAVE CONTRIBUTED TO USD 230'S SUCCESS.

Spring Hill Schools' history includes a host of traditions excellence in the classroom, excellence on the field, a smalltown school district with ever-increasing growth and deep roots in the community that go back generations.

> "Our music teacher, Mrs. Mohn, paired us up to do a duet," Tim chuckles, recalling how he first fell for Sharon. "She paired us up to sing a duet from 'Fiddler on the Roof,' and from that day on, she always considered herself as the matchmaker."

For Mark, meanwhile, being the son of a long-serving school board official in the district where he attended school never posed any problems or awkwardness. But, like any small town, on those rare occasions when Mark might have a bit of good-natured but harmless fun, you can bet word traveled auickly.

"My parents always knew about anything before I even got home for the day," Mark recalls, smiling.

And now, being the father of two USD 230 students as well as a school administrator, Mark says he sees that continuation of tradition as more humorous than anything else.

"It's funny, but it's not weird. I see it as fun," he says of being both father and principal.

Now, Mark's two sons are among the younger generations to walk through the halls of the district's schools. His oldest having just graduated from Spring Hill High School and is planning to study at Hutchinson Community College to become a firefighter. Mark's younger son wants to work as an electrical lineman.

"They're both kind of hands-on," Mark explains. "Go get your hands dirty, work hard, and help people. That's their mentality."

Tim, who has an adult son, an adult daughter, and five grandchildren (three of whom are still in school), says he's been impressed with the town and school district's growth in recent years. USD 230 finds itself always able to adapt to the growth in the community, Tim says, but he's confident in the leaders who will help usher in that change.

"And now our high school is nearing capacity. So how do you manage that?" Tim says, "you just have to do what's best for the community, the district, and the kids. It comes down to wanting to make a community decision."

Mark says one of the things he enjoys is the variety of extracurriculars available to all students, regardless of their abilities or talents.

"I think that Spring Hill is still at that level where kids can be involved in almost anything," he says. "Everyone gets to go out for the team. ... Even if they're not a starter, they still want to be a part of a team."

Tim and Mark say they're proud that, in a community full of change, generations of their family members have been a constant, unwavering presence in Spring Hill's school district, carrying on a myriad of traditions and preserving history. Those traditions, both big and small, include not only the Meeks' presence in classrooms and administrative offices, but also things like participating in holiday celebrations, portraying Santa and Mrs. Claus and handing out candy canes to students.

"By people knowing you and your family, you're building trust over the years," Mark says.

As its population swells and generations come and go from the schools' hallways, USD 230 continues to embrace and embody small-town values, notably, the giving nature of those who attend, patronize, and work at its schools.

"I love when I get to go out and see our students, the pride you get when they get together. For me, there's still a small community feel," Tim says. "People are still there to help each other out. They're there for the right reasons. It's about the kids. Everything we do is for the kids."

And though the word "legacy" might be spoken in sentences alongside the Meek family name, Mark says he wants to be remembered simply.

"I don't know that I need a legacy," he says. "I want people to know someone came, cared, and helped."

School Band

Among the boys in the school a liking for the musical art seems to have sprung up. During the first part of the year a class in band instruments was organized by Fred Meek for the purpose of preparing the young men for the town band. After a few practices and lessons on the theory of music the class began on pieces, and before long they could render fair music. These meetings were, however, discontinued on account of the cold weather, but it is intended that they shall start again soon.
